





Bachelor's Degree in Education (B.Ed.)

The B.Ed. programme was started in the year 1950. It is of two year duration consisting of four semesters. The programme has thirteen theory papers, four papers on Enhancing Professional Capacities (EPC) and Practicals. A compulsory paper on Development of Moral and Social values is also offered among the theory papers. 6 Elective subjects from the area of teacher preparation are offered. The syllabi of these papers have been carefully designed. Apart from these theory papers students should undergo teaching practice and practicals in each semester.

Master Degree in Education (M.Ed.)

The M.Ed. programme was started in the year 1964. It is of two year duration and offered in four semesters. The programme has twelve theory papers and practical activities. Competence Enhancement Programme (CEP), Performance Enhancement Programme (PEP) and Internship, besides the above, thesis is compulsory for all students.


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M.Phil. and Ph.D. Programmes

The College offers M.Phil. (Master of Philosophy in Education) and Ph.D. (Doctor of Philosophy in Education) degree programmes on full-time and part-time basis. The Ph.D. and M.Phil. programmes were started in the years 1966 and 1977 respectively.

IGNOU Programmes

The college is one of the study centres of IGNOU's distance education programme for B.Ed., M.Ed., M.A. (Edn.) & PGDET.

Value Added Courses

The College offers the following Value Added Courses for the benefit of the B.Ed., students. The descriptions of the courses are as follows:

1. Proficiency Course in Spoken English

1. Information and Communication Technology





B.Ed. Programme

1. Eligibility for Admission

Candidates with Bachelor's Degree and/or Master's Degree in Arts/ Sciences, Bachelor's in Engineering or Technology with specialization in Science/Mathematics or any other qualification equivalent thereto, are eligible for admission to programme. The reservation and relaxation for SC/ ST/OBC/PWD and other categories shall be as per the rules of the Central Government / State Government whichever is applicable. However the minimum eligibility marks for admission to B.Ed. is given below:

The marks obtained in the UG Degree alone shall be taken to arrive at the eligibility even if they possess PG degree in the same subject. In case of Economics, Commerce and Home Science, the candidates should have studied the same subjects at UG and PG levels. A minimum pass is enough for the differently abled students.







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8. Teaching Practice

For 2 years B.Ed. programme, the student teacher must go for internship for 20 weeks. 4 weeks in the I year and 16 weeks in the II year.

9. Scheme of Examination

There will be a total of 12 theory papers (11 core papers and 1 elective paper) spread over four semesters under the area 'Perspectives in Education' and 8 theory papers in Optional subjects under the area 'Curriculum and Pedagogic Studies'. Each theory paper consists of 50 marks for internal and 50 marks for external assessment. Examination for each theory paper shall be of 3 hours duration.

The various items of practical will run continuously during four semesters and will be assessed continuously, internally and externally. At the end of the programme, there will be an external examination for each candidate by a suitably constituted board of supervising examiners to increase credibility.

10. Criteria for the award of Internal Marks

The internal marks of 50 for each paper will be awarded as per the following classification.

- Continuous Internal Assessment Test – 1 - 10 marks
- Continuous Internal Assessment Test – 2 - 10 marks
- Model Examination - 10 marks
- Assignments - 10 marks
- Paper specific practical / seminar - 10 marks

A candidate who fails in one or more of the written papers may present himself at subsequent examination in such papers only in which he has failed.



College Regulations

1. Punctuality

Time:

- 9.45am – 1.00pm with a break of 15 minutes
- 2.00pm - 5.00pm with a break of 10 minutes
- Students should be present in the classroom at the stroke of the first bell at 9.45am.
- The first hour will start with a prayer for the whole college at 9.45am.
- Avoid coming late to the classes. The late comers should report to the Principal. They should get his permission for admission into the classroom.

2. Assembly

Common prayers both in the morning and evening are important features of the college life in which all should participate.

3. Dress Code

The following will be the College uniform for different occasions:

- a. Regular wear: White Shirts and White Dhotis.
- b. Physical Education class and Community Work: Blue shorts, White banian with sleeves and White canvas shoes.
- c. Ceremonial parades: White full pants, White shirt and White canvas shoes.

All the students should procure the above uniforms.

4. Identity Card

- Each student-teacher is expected to possess an identity card with his/her recent photograph affixed on it duly attested by the Principal.

- All should wear their identity card as they enter the college campus. Without identity card the student-teacher will not be permitted to enter the college premises
- All student-teachers should produce their identity card at the security post as and when asked.
- Loss of identity card should be reported immediately and duplicate will be issued on paying a fee of Rs.50/-.
- All student-teachers should surrender their ID cards at the end of the degree programme.

5. Attendance

Students should be punctual and regular in attendance. If they are late for a session they will be considered absent for that session.

6. Leave

Leave must be applied for and got sanctioned in advance. No student who has failed to get 90% of the attendance prescribed by the college will be permitted to appear for the semester examinations.

7. Disciplinary Norms

- Smoking and such other practices are strictly forbidden.
- Students are not permitted to engage themselves in any other avocation or to attend any other institution during the programme.
- Community work such as cleaning the room and the college and hostel compounds, repair and maintenance of roads and play grounds, serving food in the hostel are essential part of the college and hostel life. Besides these, one period a week will also be allotted for other community activities and all students have to take part in all these activities.
- Student's progress will be assessed periodically through assignments, projects, quiz and mid-semester examinations. These may count for internal assessment.



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- Students will be responsible for all tools or apparatus placed in their charge. Any damage or loss has to be made good by the student concerned.
- Students should not organize meetings, entertainments or collect money for any purpose in the college without the permission of the Principal.
- At the time of admission the parent or guardian of the student should give an undertaking that he has clearly understood the rules and regulations of the college and that if his son/ward misbehaves, he shall abide by the decisions taken by the Principal.

8. Suspend or Dismiss

The Principal has the right to suspend or dismiss any student at any time from the college for the following reasons:


- Irregularity in attendance.
 - Indifference towards studies.
 - Non-observance of college rules and regulations.
 - Non-payment of college fees and other dues.
 - Non-submission of assignments, record note books, project reports etc. in time.
 - Neglect of community work, social service activities, prayer etc.
 - Unsatisfactory progress of scholarship holders.
- Only men candidates are admitted to the B.Ed. programme.
 - All students selected for the B.Ed. course shall live in the Hostel attached to this college. They shall also abide by the rules and regulations of the Hostel.
 - Ragging of any kind and any magnitude inside/outside the college campus will lead to dismissal.
 - Possession/use of camera, cellular phones within the campus is strictly forbidden. Use of cellular phones inside the buildings/ corridors will result in confiscation no return of the mobile phones.



- Causing damage to the college/public property by scribbling on walls, graffiti writing, scratching walls/toilets, breaking furniture, lab equipment, damaging fittings and pipes etc. will lead to dismissal.

9. Notice on Ragging

- As per the directions of the Supreme Court by SLP No. 24295 of 2006 dated 16-05-2017 and the Notification E.No.37-3/Legal/AICTE/2009 issued by the AICTE New Delhi, students is asked to note the following:
- "Ragging is a heinous crime and is punishable under various sections of Law"
- The Institution can make any one or combination of the following punishments against the students who indulge in ragging:
 - Cancellation of admission.
 - Debaring from appearing in any test / examination or other evaluation process.
 - Withholding / withdrawing scholarship / fellowship and other benefits.
 - Suspension / expulsion from the hostel.
 - Expulsion from the institution and consequent debaring from admission to any other institution.
 - Collective punishment when the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers.
 - If anyone is found guilty of ragging, he / she is entitled to a Rigorous Imprisonment of Two Years and Penalty by the Indian Penal Code. If the crime is of sexually oriented then the punishment may go up-to 10 years Rigorous Imprisonment and Penalty.

The B.Ed. programme was started in the year 1950. It is of two year duration consisting of four semesters. The programme has twenty theory papers, four papers on Enhancing Professional Capacities (EPC) and Practicals. A compulsory paper on Development of Moral and Social Values is also offered among the theory papers. 7 Elective subjects from the area of teacher preparation are offered. The syllabi of these papers have been carefully designed. Apart from these theory papers students should undergo teaching practice and practicals in each semester.

IGNOU Programmes

The college is one of the study centres of IGNOU's Distance Education programme for B.Ed., and M.A. (Edn.), and other Diploma / Certificate Programmes related to Education.

Value Added Courses

The College offers the following Value Added Courses for the benefit of the B.Ed., students. The descriptions of the courses are as follows:

1. Proficiency Course on Spoken English

A compulsory course on Phonetics and Spoken English has been arranged for all the students of the college thrice a week. 2. Certificate Course in School Librarianship


Model Schools

4. Duration of the Programme







College Regulations

1. Punctuality

Time: 9.45 a.m. – 1.00 p.m. with a break of 15 minutes.
2.00 p.m. - 5.00 p.m. with a break of 10 minutes.

- Students should be present in the classroom at the stroke of the first bell at 9.45 a.m.
- The first hour will start with a prayer for the whole college at 9.45 a.m.
- Avoid coming late to the classes. The late comers should report to the Principal. They should get his permission for admission into the classroom.

2. Assembly

Common prayers both in the morning and evening are important features of the college life in which all should participate.

3. Dress Code

The following will be the College uniform for different occasions:

a. Regular Wear:

- White Shirts and White Dhotis for men
- Saree for women

All the students should procure the above uniforms.

4. Identity Card

- Each student-teacher is expected to possess an identity card with his/her recent photograph affixed on it duly attested by the Principal.
- All should wear their identity card as they enter the college campus. Without identity card the student-teacher will not be permitted to enter the college premises.



- All student-teachers should produce their identity card at the security post as and when asked.
- Loss of identity card should be reported immediately and duplicate will be issued on paying a fee of Rs.50/-.
- All student-teachers should surrender their ID cards at the end of the degree programme.

5. Attendance

- Students should be punctual and regular in attendance. If they are late for a session they will be considered absent for that session.

6. Leave

- The University requires that an accurate record be kept for the reasons for any leave taken. Leave must be applied for and got sanctioned in advance. No student who has failed to get 90% of the attendance prescribed by the college will be permitted to appear for the semester examinations.

7. Disciplinary Norms


- Smoking and such other practices are strictly forbidden.
- Students are not permitted to engage themselves in any other vocation or to attend any other institution during the programme.
- Student's progress will be assessed periodically through assignments, projects, quiz and mid-semester examinations. These may count for internal assessment.
- Students will be responsible for all tools or apparatus placed in their charge. Any damage or loss has to be made good by the student concerned.
- Students should not organize meetings, entertainments or collect money for any purpose in the College without the permission of the Principal.



- At the time of admission the parent or guardian of the student should give an undertaking that he/she has clearly understood the rules and regulations of the College and that if his son/ward misbehaves, he/she shall abide by the decisions taken by the Principal.


8. Suspension or Dismissal

- The Principal has the right to suspend or dismiss any student at any time from the College for the following reasons:
 - a. Irregularity in attendance.
 - b. Indifference towards studies.
 - c. Non-observance of College rules and regulations.
 - d. Non-payment of College fees and other dues.
 - e. Non-submission of assignments, record note books, project reports, etc. in time.
 - f. Neglect of community work, social service activities, prayer, etc.
 - g. Unsatisfactory progress of scholarship holders.
- Candidates selected for the M.Ed., M.Phil., & Ph.D. Programme may also join the hostel. Hostel rules will be binding on all who reside in the hostel.
- Remittances of any due to the College should be sent directly to the Secretary/Principal either by D.D of M.O.
- Ragging of any kind and any magnitude inside/outside the College campus will lead to dismissal.
- Possession/use of camera, cellular phones within the campus is strictly forbidden. Use of cellular phones inside the buildings/corridors will result in confiscation and the mobile phones will not be returned.
- Causing damage to the College/Public property by scribbling on walls, graffiti writing, scratching walls/toilets, breaking furniture, lab equipment, damaging fittings and pipes etc. will lead to dismissal.

9. Notice on Ragging

- As per the directions of the Supreme Court by SLP No. 24295 of 2006 dated 16-05-2017 and the Notification E.No.37-3/Legal/AICTE/2009 issued by the AICTE New Delhi, students is asked to note the following:
- "Ragging is a heinous crime and is punishable under various sections of Law"
- The Institution can make any one or combination of the following punishments against the students who indulge in ragging:
 - a. Cancellation of admission.
 - b. Debarring from appearing in any test / examination or other evaluation process.
 - c. Withholding / withdrawing scholarship / fellowship and other benefits.
 - d. Suspension / expulsion from the hostel.
 - e. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
 - f. Collective punishment when the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers.
 - g. If anyone is found guilty of ragging, he/she is entitled to a Rigorous Imprisonment of Two Years and Penalty by the Indian Penal Code. If the crime is of sexually oriented then the punishment may go up-to 10 years Rigorous Imprisonment and Penalty.



10. College Library

- The library rules must be followed or else students will forfeit the privilege of borrowing books.

11. Mentoring

- Each student-teacher will be assigned a teaching faculty called 'Mentor' to accompany him/her in his/her academic journey until the completion of the programme. The student-teacher is expected to meet the mentor periodically for consultation and counselling.
